Towards new anthropological commons: Entangled ethnographies of decolonial memory

activism in Cape Town, Windhoek, and Berlin

My presentation draws on a portion of ethnographic research, which I have conducted on decolonial memory activism in southern Africa and Germany, with the aim to contribute to a transnational discussion of decolonizing Anthropology towards a new commons. It is im-portant from where I speak: my perspective is informed by decades of research, teaching and activism in South Africa and Namibia. I aim to present an argument how learning, empirically and theoretically, from southern African scholarship and activism can enable genuinely cosmopolitan horizons of a transformative anthropological commons.

Heike Becker is Chair of the Anthropology Department of the University of the Western Cape in South Africa, where she teaches courses about anthropological theory, visual culture, popular culture, and the politics of difference. Her research interests have focused on the politics of memory, popular and visual culture, and social movements of resistance in southern Africa (South Africa and Namibia). She currently also works on decolonizing the public space, memory activism and anti-racist politics in Germany and the United Kingdom.
